The Consortium significantly expands its federal policy action plan and 2014 positions to guide 2015-16 ESEA reauthorization advocacy with a focus on issues of high standards, accountability and innovation in assessment. **New Members Include:** Wake County Public School System (NC) The Consortium initiates focused community of practice conversations, as a foundation for recommendations regarding areas of focus. The Consortium initiates benchmarking discussions, as a foundation for the establishment of data-driven, systemic collaboration over time. The Consortium develops and submits specific, actionable ESEA 2015 recommendations regarding standards, accountability and innovation in assessment. Direct Hill and Administration outreach follows—including **New Members Include:** all-member meetings with senior House education staff. Garland Independent School District (TX) The Consortium publishes a commentary in Education Week regarding **Knox County Schools (TN)** its assessment beliefs and ESEA recommendations. School District of Palm Beach County (FL) The Consortium elects a new Chair and Vice-Chair, firmly establishing the sustainability and strong governance of the organization. The ESEA is reauthorized by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), which incorporates many of the Consortium's priorities and suggestions. The Consortium engages in a deep dive into CTE and performance assessment during a fall meeting hosted by Virginia Beach City Public Schools. The Consortium submits recommendations regarding effective 2016 implementation of ESSA regarding regulations, guidance, and other issues related to the reauthorized ESEA. **New Members Include:** Chesterfield County Public Schools (VA) The Consortium successfully nominates Alvin Wilbanks to serve on the **ESSA negotiated rulemaking committee**, representing all local school district superintendents and school board members. The Consortium is named one of twelve winners of the national **Assessment for Learning Project grant competition** to support five members of the innovative assessment community of practice to collaborate specifically on the development and use of performancebased assessments (the Performance Assessment Collaborative (PAC)). The Consortium partners with Education Resource Strategies (ERS) to launch a second community of practice initiative with four members, focused on resource allocation and how to leverage ESSA's new financial

transparency rules to advance equity.

The Consortium reviews and revises its mission, vision, and priorities, focusing on four primary areas of common interest: equity, effective human capital, high-quality systems of assessment, and personalized learning.

Consortium members meet with U.S. Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos to discuss policy priorities, including ESSA implementation.

The Consortium produces its second annual Benchmarking Report, which provides members the opportunity to compare progress and performance across participating districts.

The PAC districts pilot new approaches to building educators' capacity to design high-quality performance-based assessments, using a common rubric for evaluating assessment quality.

Consortium members share promising practices at AASA's 2018 National Conference on Education, hosting one panel with ERS about ESSA's new financial transparency requirements and another on increasing participation in and performance on rigorous academic opportunities.

The Consortium engages in a deep dive into personalized learning during a fall meeting hosted by Chesterfield County Public Schools.
